**Meeting Items**

Introductions

Each attendee introduced themselves to the group. Stephanie outlined the goal of the meeting, which was to finalize the recommendations for modification to the current list of measures on the KY Core Healthcare Measures Set (KCHMS), including removing current measures, changing priority status of current measures, and addition of new measures.

Potential Measures Review

The group used average scores from scoring each measure on the rubric to guide the meeting's discussion.

Three measures currently were agreed at the last meeting to be evaluated for possible addition to the KY Core Healthcare Measures Set. The conversation for each of the measures was as follows:

- Care for Older Adults – Medication Review | Average Score: 9.5
  - This measure is good for care overall, but it's difficult for providers to get all of the information they need to truly impact this measure. Committee members on the call ranked it fairly low and suggested perhaps including it on the future development list.
- Pneumococcal Vaccination Coverage for Older Adults | Average Score: 8.3
  - Proper pneumococcal vaccination is high impact, but there are many problems with this measure. Medicare doesn't pay for the vaccination, multi-step shots are problematic for meeting the specific guidelines, and the measure is a bit of moving target. We might want to keep this on the future considerations list.
- Documentation of Signed Opioid Treatment Agreement | Average Score: 8.8
  - The committee was looking for a preventive care measure related to opioids. This is a critically important process, but data extraction is manual and tedious. Nationally, this measure is considered topped out.

Measures Recommendation Discussion

There were not enough committee members on the call to make a decision on these three measures. Stephanie agreed to send a poll following the meeting for a vote on these three measures.

Mike Hagen brought up more generally to the group that there are two areas of preventive care that we need to consider in the future:

- We need to think about something beyond individual process measures and ask ourselves what is it about primary care that leads to better global outcomes?
- Given that only 20% of health is driven by clinical care, we need to look at social determinants of health
