HEALTHCARE QUALITY MEASUREMENT AND TRANSPARENCY

Improving quality and value of care through measurement, alignment, and transparency

Leading the Way in Measurement Reporting and Alignment

Healthcare quality and cost measurement aims to provide better, more affordable care. Measuring and incenting the right things is important but doing so requires experts to agree on what those things should be. The KHC continued its measurement alignment work to identify the measures that reduce measurement burden, improve focus, and ultimately measure what matters most to key stakeholders. A public-private committee of experts convened by the KHC, finalized the second Kentucky Healthcare Measures Set (KCHMS), with 38 core primary care measures. The measures listed on the KCHMS were included in KHC annual reporting. The KHC released its 13th annual quality healthcare reports to more than 5,000 providers and group practices in Kentucky and Southern Indiana, continuing to be the only group that combines Commercial, Medicaid, and Medicare Advantage data for quality reporting. The data also allows us to see where we have improved - or not - as a community in these key indicators of quality healthcare.

Starting the Conversation Around Hospital Pricing

Healthcare affordability is one of the most pressing issues facing employers, healthcare purchasers, and patients. The KHC partnered with the Employers' Forum of Indiana to participate in the RAND National Hospital Price Study 2.0, which revealed the price of commercial hospital pricing relative to Medicare. The KHC recruited employers to submit their data for both RAND 2.0 and 3.0 studies, making Kentucky one of 25 states reported in study 2.0. Kentucky ranked fourth lowest in prices paid to hospitals, at 186% of Medicare compared to the national average of 241%. But we fell behind in quality and safety. These findings turned on the light for many employers who generally operate in the dark around hospital pricing, yet are responsible for purchasing healthcare for more than half of Americans. Study results made national headlines, from The New York Times to Modern Healthcare, and the KHC presented Kentucky's results at the KHC June Community Health Forum, starting the hospital affordability conversation in the Commonwealth.

COMMUNITY HEALTH IMPROVEMENT

Improving community health and wellbeing

Driving Youth Mental Health Efforts with Conversation Cards and Podcast

The KHC continued its partnership with the Student Alliance for Mental Health Innovation and Action. StAMINA, a network of passionate students driving the movement to improve youth mental health through research and action, implemented two projects in addition to its second annual student summit: conversation starter cards designed to encourage families to discuss mental health openly and a youth mental health podcast produced by students for students.

Addressing the Opioid Epidemic Throughout the Commonwealth

As a partner in the Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE), the KHC completed projects to expand access to high quality, evidence-based opioid prevention, treatment, recovery, and harm reduction services and supports. Two ways the KHC accomplished this was through an employer toolkit and an opioid use and pain management cohort (see Employer and Purchaser Network section).

The discussions turn into actionable tools like the Employers Opioid Toolkit and the Kentucky Core Healthcare Measures Set. EMPLOYER AND PURCHASER NETWORK

Engaging employers in the Triple Aim goals

In addition to the education and recruitment of employers through the RAND National Hospital Price Study, the KHC has continued its work with the Kentucky Opioid Response Effort (KORE) to help support employers in addressing the Commonwealth's opioid crisis.

Roundtable Launches “Opioids and Workplace” Employer Toolkit

The KHC convened employers and key healthcare stakeholders to guide the development of a toolkit to provide best practices for employers to support their employees and their dependents in prevention, treatment, and recovery from opioid misuse and opioid use disorder. The KHC released the toolkit with a half-day event that included presentations and discussions that explored the toolkit's application and other relevant topics. Since the release, several states and prominent national organizations have praised the toolkit and requested presentations and use of its recommendations. Recognizing the co-evolving relationship between pain and the opioid crisis, the KHC is developing an additional section to this toolkit specific to pain management.

Opioid Work Continues with Opioid Use and Pain Management Cohort

The KHC launched a six-month cohort of employers dedicated to becoming partners in fighting the opioid crisis in Kentucky. The cohort, representing 23% of commercially-insured Kentuckians, is diving deeper into how the KHC's “Opioids and the Workplace” toolkit recommendations can be implemented by national and local employers through healthcare best practice sharing of benefit design and workplace policies.

EDUCATION

Catalyzing healthcare transformation through education and collaboration

The KHC educates its members and the community through blog posts, newsletters, webinars, and events that bring in international, national, and local healthcare thought leaders on priority healthcare topics. In 2019, the KHC held 15 events, including its fifth annual conference, which had the highest attendance yet, drawing more than 200 healthcare stakeholders from the region.
